



What is Alabama History Day?


Alabama History Day is a state-level affiliate of National History Day, a year-long program that offers teachers a dynamic learning tool for the classroom — and offers students a creative way to engage with history. The Alabama Humanities Alliance presents History Day annually, with the competition open to all public, private, and home schools, grades 6-12.

Alabama History Day's 2026 state contest takes place April 9, at American Village in Montevallo. It's an ideal setting for this year's History Day theme: Revolution, Reaction, Reform in History — inspired by the 250th anniversary of America's Declaration of Independence!

How it works

Students research topics of their own choosing, connected to the year's theme. Teachers then help students apply inquiry-based learning. That process can include exploring primary materials held by libraries, museums, and archives. Conducting oral history interviews. Maybe even visiting historic sites.

Students also choose how to creatively share their research—as exhibits, papers, websites, dramatic performances, or documentary films. Classroom, school, and regional contests precede the state competition. Students can participate individually or in teams.
